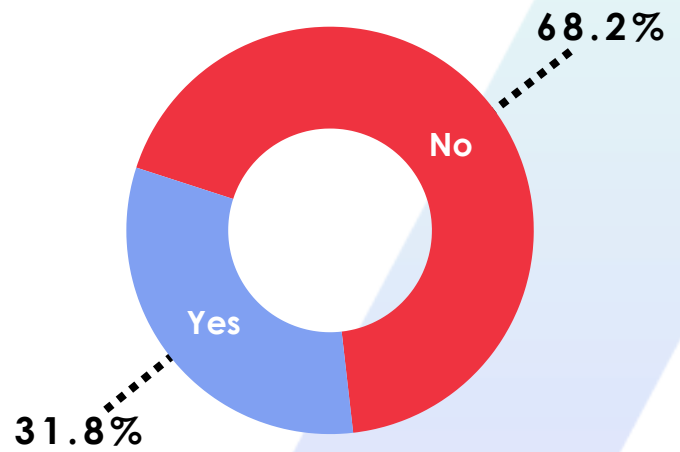
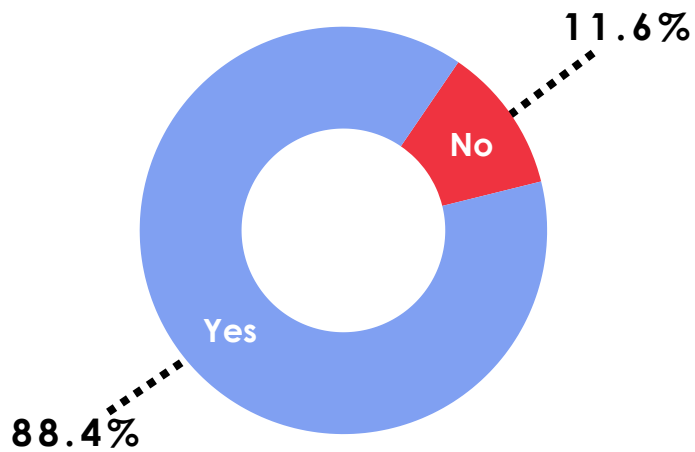

## A CLOSER LOOK: SCOUTS AND GUIDES



The Boy Scouts and Girl Guides started in the early 1900s to help boys and girls learn useful skills and enjoy adventures. In 1907, Robert Baden-Powell, a British army officer, founded the Boy Scouts after organising a camp on Brownsea Island, where boys learned about camping, teamwork, and outdoor skills.

Seeing the success of the Boy Scouts, Baden-Powell's sister Agnes, and later his wife Olave, decided to create a similar organisation for girls. In 1910, they started the Girl Guides, which focused on teaching girls skills like first aid, outdoor activities, and community service.

Today, Scouts and Guides exist worldwide, helping millions of children develop confidence, leadership, and a love for nature.

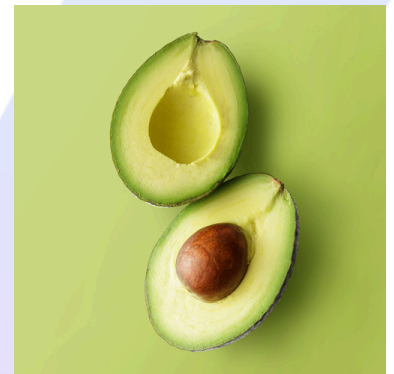
### Apple's iPhone AI overhaul

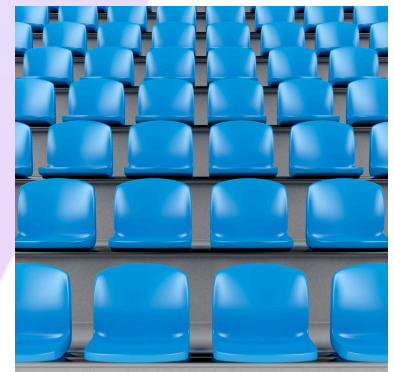
### Every laser helps

## **Snap election for France...**

France's President, Emmanuel Macron, has announced a snap election for July. After a bad result in the EU elections, he said, "I've decided to give you back the choice of our parliamentary future through the vote".



## **...And Belgium's PM resigns**

Just next door in Belgium, Prime Minister Alexander De Croo has resigned after his party received just 7% of the vote in the EU elections. Different parties must now enter talks to see if they can enter a coalition.



## **Bulgaria takes to the polls again**

Still in Europe: people in Bulgaria have voted in a general election (the sixth in three years). Although the GERB Party won the most votes, it needs at least two other parties to join a coalition in order to form a Government.



## **Biden versus Trump ramps up**

A recent poll in the USA found that most of the people who support Joe Biden only do so because they oppose Donald Trump. 54% of people said that keeping Trump out of office was why they would vote for Biden.
